A follower or disciple?

Spring school is a chance for Ministers from the South Western Synod to meet, share time and learn together. This year the theme of the conference is discipleship in the 21st Century. This got me thinking: are we more like followers or disciples of Jesus? Discipleship is not a term that is used very much in the modern world. Its use is often reserved for cults but the term "follower" or "following" with social media is taking on a new lease of life. People can follow celebrities, politicians, companies and other organisations like charities or protest movements, soap operas and sports teams, meaning they avidly read (and perhaps believe) the latest news and writings produced by the individual or organisations. The most popular are Katie Perry (96 million), Justin Bieber (92) million and Barack Obama (86 million). People can also follow family and friends - that's how I know what my nephews and nieces are up to. But what does it mean to follow? Is it only a question of following the latest news? I follow Yeovil Town Football Club and I am happy to support them through the ups and downs during the season. I also follow two mental health charities.

As Christians we can follow in the same way, happy to observe and support without getting too heavily involved. When Jesus asks us to follow him I suspect he meant much more than supporting from the sidelines, or turning up on match day.

That's why I like the term "disciple". A disciple is involved in faith seven days a week, is always learning new things, realises they never know it all, looks to the master for advice and learns best by trying things out in a safe environment, although leaps of faith are sometimes required. Jesus invites us to be disciples in the 21st century, not by reading from books or even by studying the Bible (though that is a good starting point), but by simply trying to faithfully to do his will – day in and day out, as a way of life not an optional extra.

As disciples we take great heart from the Easter story knowing he is alongside us all the way, still teaching and guiding us.

ALISON GREAVES IS IN DEMAND. The 18-year-old, a member of United Reformed Church Youth, has just returned from New York where she was the UK's sole delegate to the <u>United Nations 2017 Winter Youth Assembly</u>. The conference, at UN headquarters from 1 to 3 February, involved 13,000 young people and adults from over 100 countries.

The teenager, who attends <u>Bamford Chapel and Norden United Reformed Church</u> in Rochdale, flew out after speaking about the trip at her church and the United Reformed Church Youth Assembly in Staffordshire. Alison said: 'My role now is to educate people, in particular young people, about the UN's 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) which aim to improve 17 aspects of life in both the developing and developed world. Personally I feel this is how I am going to let Jesus shine in my life.'

THANK YOU FROM THE LORD'S LARDER

Many thanks to everyone who responded to last month's appeal for food items, it was amazing to see those food items coming into the Larder. The first 2 months of 2017 we have been able to help 426 adults and 181 children in need of emergency food support in the South Somerset Area, that is a hundred more adults, and the same number of children compared with last year.

"The trouble is that there are so many things that we doubt in this life. What can, and who shall, we trust?" preached Rev. Hodges from the pulpit on Easter Sunday, some way through her sermon. The bright April sunshine streamed through the windows either side of her, and the golden rays made the brown of the pews it encountered light up with a jolly brightness in comparison to the more sombre hue of those left in the shadows. The congregation, including Sophie, her brother Angel, their parents and their old friend Mr. Jones at the back, listened with attentive ears. On this Sunday, of all the Sundays in the year, the strength of their faith and devotion could be seen on their faces. Once again they were being reminded of that day when God intervened to free us from sin and death, of that day when Christ followed God's will. Each person had thoughts about that wondrous event, the first Easter.

Mr. Jones thought about how Christ had not been afraid of the confrontation with the authorities, nor of the road He had to take. Then his mind turned to ponder on how so many people have been killed for their Christian faith, which could be different from that of the majority around them. Time and time again this sort of thing has happened throughout history, thought Mr. Jones. Christ did his duty that fateful Friday and many have followed in his footsteps, and are still following.

Sophie thought about it all with a touch of sadness, even though she rejoiced about the happy ending, and the new beginning, that occurred on that first Easter morning. As the sermon continued she thought about the unbelief of the people at the time, and how Christ's words 'Forgive them Lord, they know not what they do' was as relevant then as it is now. She couldn't help thinking that a lot of people in the world *do* know what they

are doing as regards injustice, exploitation and greed, know that it is wrong, but still carry on doing it. For others, well, it was not as though they hadn't had the opportunity to think about the unseen as well as the seen, to raise their minds above the earthly gods of wealth and worry. It seemed to Sophie that the world could be divided into three types of people: those who want answers to everything without considering God, those who want answers but believe that He knows all the answers anyway, and finally those who don't care. Atheists, believers, and agnostics; but if there could be something more fulfilling than just this world, why not believe in it? In an RE lesson at school, Mrs. Priest had said that there was nothing to lose in believing, and that she couldn't understand why more people didn't think about these things and come to an opinion. Sophie found it hard to understand atheists at all – how could they be so sure? On the other hand, she could understand the "don't know and don't really care" set of folk: in a situation where there is no one telling you to make a decision, why bother to make one? Why not just go along with life and see what happens? Sophie knew that this was where Christians and the advertisement of their churches needed to make an impact. One could argue with an atheist all day long and get nowhere, but someone with an open mind is free to make a choice.

Angel thought about the two chocolate eggs he was going to crack open later that afternoon.

"We have been let down by things in the past, so who's to say that things will go well in the future?" continued the minister, oblivious to the wandering minds in her congregation. "Other words for 'doubt' are 'worry' and 'fear'. Together, these three words, 'doubt', 'worry' and 'fear', can make us a load of nervous wrecks, frightened of our own shadows. The situation isn't helped by the overwhelming host of health and safety, political correctness and other stuff that throttle the courage out of anyone thinking of getting out of bed in the morning. And no wonder you don't see many groups of Christian folk doing a spot of evangelising on the high street, they're afraid they might get 'kettled' into WH Smiths by the police or something...

This story of Christ going to the cross is one of courage. It is a story of a man doing what He knew to be right, and not wavering. Ah, but He did waver a little, didn't He? He asked God in the garden whether it had to go the way it was all looking like going. Yet he was ready for the answer that God gave. He was brave. He didn't turn around and say: 'No, I can't do that. It's beyond me to go through all that. I know you have given me special abilities, but look, can't I do something else?' Would we be ready to be so brave? What is God asking us to do? We need to listen to God talking to us in our dreams and through our conscience. But to get back to my theme, we

must stand firm in our faith and not lose our spark, however much the ways of the world crowd in on what we know to be our true nature, which is from God. Do we believe that there is something in everyone that is of God? Shall we call it 'the soul'? Does the Spirit touch the soul, so that the person is awakened to life with a capital 'L'? Is it 'doubt', 'worry' and 'fear' that keep the Spirit away from the soul, in the same way that doubt, worry and fear keep us all from doing all sorts of adventurous things in this life? After His conversation with God, Christ had no doubt, worry, or fear. He went calmly, believing that God would hold Him in His hands. We must do that too, go calmly about our lives, and encourage others to do the same.

So the message I want to leave you with today is this: We have everything material in this world that we want. We couldn't really ask for more, even though we still do. There is the continual march of progress and if we make problems for ourselves then God has given us the brains to solve them. So much for what we want; now what about what we *need*? What do we really need? I would say we need something to believe in. What shall we believe in? How about some hero of our day, or maybe that our football team will win the cup? Surely our belief in such things is temporal. I can think of nothing better to believe in than a God who sent us a Saviour to show us that there is a better Life to wait and hope for, a Life in a heavenly place free from all pain, doubt, worry and fear. And the key to that place is given to us by the events of that great day all those years ago, when Jesus was seen again, *alive*! And then He went home, to live in that blessed place, and to lead us there.

I hope you love believing in that. I love believing in that. It makes life worth living. Amen."
